# Job Description: Outdoor, Duke of Edinburgh and Uniform Services Technician 2 (Support-Technician)



Reporting to: Head of Faculty of Human Behaviour

## Key purposes of this role:

- To provide effective outdoor small group and individual instruction and skills assessment
- To provide support for designated groups of students to enable successful delivery of highquality teaching and learning.
- To provide practical, administrative and technical support for academic staff and students on all Outdoor, Duke of Edinburgh and Uniform Services courses and related enrichment in line with College and Faculty policy and objectives.
- Work effectively as part of the Outdoor, Duke of Edinburgh, and Uniform services Team

Your line manager will be the Faculty Head of Human Behaviour but on a day to day basis you will work to the Senior Outdoor Instructor.

Incremental progression is subject to satisfactory performance. This role may be uprated to Technical Instructor on gaining specified outdoor qualifications.



Technician 2 for Outdoor, Duke of Edinburgh, and Uniformed Services | Faculty of Human Behaviour

Dear applicant,

Thank you for taking an interest in the position of Technician in Outdoor, Adventure, and Uniformed Services at Cirencester College. This role that will give you or extend your experience of supporting students, mainly outdoors, on Duke of Edinburgh, Outdoor and uniformed services vocational courses, along with related enrichment activities across the college. The Human Behaviour faculty, in which the role is situated, is home to sport, uniformed services, and outdoor adventure; alongside a number of A level and T Level subjects.

We are a top performing 6<sup>th</sup> form college, which was previously a tertiary college. Amongst the tertiary work we retain is some 16-19 vocational provision at levels 1 and 2, apprenticeships, a small amount of adult work including professional courses and HE. However, the vast majority of our c2900 students are doing level 3 programmes, mainly A Levels. Excitingly, the College is one of the first across the country which has been selected to deliver the new innovative T level qualifications. In November 2018 the college was graded as good with some outstanding elements.

We are located in a rural area with all the additional challenges that brings. Approximately two thirds of our students come in by coach each morning. In doing so they are choosing to come to us rather than our many competitors. We have survived and grown by listening to students (and parents) and delivering a great student experience and value added. Students come to us for the choice, the atmosphere and the freedom to develop in a safe and supportive environment.



In terms of a work setting, both the college & the Cotswolds in general, are impressive. The campus itself has seen considerable investment in new buildings. It is situated on the edge of town, adjacent to the Bathurst Estate. The grounds of the Estate stretch for miles, with many staff using these to unwind, whether this be for a spot of lunch, a lunchtime stroll or a pre/post-work run.

The College is undergoing major building renovation and expansion in this area of our provision, and all engineering, construction and digital related provision will have brand new accommodation in the next academic year. This includes a contemporary new 'digital building' which is a major upgrade in technological teaching spaces for the College.

We have approximately 310 staff including managers, lecturers and a wide array of support staff.

Faculty staff work closely and effectively in subject and department teams. There are four faculties comprised of related subjects, each line-managed by a Head of Faculty, with a course leader for each subject. We encourage our staff to be innovative and proactive, seeking improvements in student experiences and training and sharing good practice sessions occurring throughout the year.

In this role you would be half of the core outdoor team although other staff also contribute at times. You would be working on a mixture of enrichment and subject elements of 16-19 student programmes.



Enrichment activities are a valued aspect of the student experience. One of the most successful programmes we run is the Duke of Edinburgh award, which you will be a key part of. This involves multiple expeditions each year for training and then for assessment. Most involve hiking, some bikes and others canoes or kayaks. The team also run climbing and water-sport enrichment and organise occasional challenges such as this trip (above) from the source of the Thames to the sea in summer 2022. Suring parts of the spring, autumn and particularly summer term, you are likely to be away on camping expeditions for much of the time. Where you work weekends lieu time is given which you can add to annual holidays.

At other times of the year, the team run environmental activities for DoE and other students in an area of land they have taken over, called the 'Axehead'. This has involved tree-planting, pond building, fencing and small building projects and a great deal of wild-flower planting. They have also run other projects elsewhere on the site.



The team also lead on the outdoor and expedition elements of the Uniform Public Services course and contribute some additional support to that course. This year we are launching the Outdoor Adventure

Course which will be led by the Senior Instructor and on which you would be supporting. This is a course aimed at students who want to get into the outdoor industry.

So, this role will really suit someone who loves being out in nature, enjoys working with young people and has, or wants to develop a skillset in outdoor pursuits and conservation. The work demands a good sense of organisation and attention to detail to make things work and patience and good listening skills in working with young people undertaking activities they find challenging. Minibus driving is an essential part of this role and if you haven't achieved the 'D' component on your licence we would support you to quickly gain it.

If you have enthusiasm and skills but are without qualifications, the role is available at level 2 and we will support you in gaining some qualifications. You could then progress to the Level 3, Instructor Role. If you have outdoor qualifications and experience already (see Person Spec) then it is available as a Level 3, Instructor Role. The role will suit someone coming from the Outdoor Pursuits Industry or a DoE Lead but would also be ideal for someone with a military background.

In summary, as a college we are passionate about helping students become the best they can be in whatever they choose to pursue but we are also passionate about staff development, and providing the platform for individuals to become outstanding in their roles.
